The mission of the First United Presbyterian Church is to make disciples of all people for the glory of God through teaching, caring and worshiping.

The countdown is on and for many of us November 5th can't come soon enough! The debates, commercials, ads and candidates vying for votes seem to consume almost all of the media and therefore our attention. Because of that there is a lot of angst in our country about the future regardless of which candidate ultimately wins. Although the presidential campaign takes most of the headlines, there are other offices seeking to be filled not only nationally but right down to our local government. As I have often encouraged folks, continue to pray for *all* the candidates. It doesn't matter if they are not the political party of your choice. They *all* need our prayers. Elections are trying times as we seek to choose individuals to lead us.



But for Christians (Presbyterians in particular!) election has another connotation. As we continue to think about the persons we may be choosing, keep in mind that God has also chosen us. In the letter of Ephesians chapter 1 we are told:

God has chosen us in Christ before the foundation of the world...

We have been chosen by God! Further, this was not a decision that God made at the last minute. I admit there have been times; despite studying the candidates and issues, I have entered the voting booth not knowing how I was going to vote! But God has chosen you before the foundation of the world! That is the amazing and humbling story of the gospel.

Knowing that we have been chosen by God can be a source of great comfort and encouragement in the midst of trying and difficult times. Consider all the different trials that come our way during the course of our lives. The apostle Paul even took the time to name a few: hardships, distress, persecution, famine, nakedness, peril, or sword. But nothing can separate us from God's love. Rhetorically, he puts it this way in Romans 8:33:

Who will bring any charge against God's elect?

Knowing that we have been chosen by God can help us keep perspective in a world that is changing so rapidly. Such assurance can give us the peace, the shalom of God, that goes beyond all understanding.



The Madison County CROP walk committee met Monday, October 14 for a wrap-up on our September event. Our results are as follows:

As you can see, First United Presbyterian Church came in 3rd in BOTH categories - consistency!! I'm so thankful for all of you who supported this effort. (It just wasn't my best year health-wise to make this work.) I'm always glad to have Brian Dickerson helping me collect your contributions, and this year Pat Dickerson and Pastor Dave joined the walk. Pastor also gave the opening prayer – THANK YOU!

And just to mention, over the 18 years we've worked with this group, we've raised a total of \$85,932.00 and contributed mostly canned goods and some non-perishables in the amount of 3546 items. Again, about 25% of our annual money collection is going to Matura/Multi-Purpose Center, and this year our non-perishables went to Paw Pantry at the Winterset Middle School. Both of these organizations help people in need in our community.

We did have a short discussion concerning continuing the walk...mostly since we only had 8 walkers this year. Do folks really WANT to walk? Short answer is that Linda (Christian church rep and our leader) and her husband Rick will continue to work of CROP Walk no matter what...so...I'm sure someone from our church will also be on the committee (YOU? ME? ANYONE?). We were a little weary at this meeting, but decided that by June, we'll all be ready to go!!

An excerpt from the *Companion to the Book of Common Worship* (Geneva Press, 2003, 150-151)

All Saints' Day (November 1) is a time to rejoice in all who through the ages have faithfully served the Lord. The day reminds us that we are part of one continuing, living communion of saints. It is a time to claim our kinship with the "glorious company of apostles ... the noble fellowship of prophets ... the white-robed army of martyrs" (Te Deum). It is a time to express our gratitude for all who in ages of darkness kept the faith, for those who have taken the gospel to the ends of the earth, for prophetic voices who have called the church to be faithful in life and service, for all who have witnessed to God's justice and peace in every nation. To rejoice with all the faithful of every generation expands our

awareness of a great company of witnesses above and around us like a cloud (Hebrews 12:1). It lifts us out of a preoccupation with our own immediate situation and the discouragements of the present. In the knowledge that others have persevered, we are encouraged to endure against all odds (Hebrews 12:1-2). Reminded that God was with the faithful of the past, we are reassured that God is with us today, moving us and all creation toward God's end in time.



While Thanksgiving is a national holiday, the tradition of giving thanks at the end of the harvest is a religious event celebrated in most cultures. The national practice of giving thanks in November is therefore quite biblical.

Scripture abounds with thanksgiving to God, for thanksgiving is part of the Christian way of life, no matter what the circumstances.

Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. — Philippians 4:6

Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.

— 1 Thessalonians 5: 18

All the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, singing, "Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be to our God forever and ever! Amen."



Christ the King / Reign of Christ/Nov. 24



Christ Pantocrator ("ruler of all"), a sixth century icon from Saint Catherine's Monastery, Mount Sinai.

At the conclusion of the Christian year, the church gives thanks and praise for sovereignty of Christ, who is Lord of all creation and is coming again in glory to reign (see Revelation 1:4-8).

This festival was established in 1925 by decree of Pope Pius XI. Originally it took place on the last Sunday in October, just prior to All Saints' Day. Now it is celebrated on the last Sunday of the Christian year, a week before the season of Advent begins.

Christ reigns supreme
An excerpt from the Companion to the Book of Common Worship
(Geneva Press, 2003, 151)

The festival of Christ the King (or Reign of Christ) ends our marking of Ordinary Time after the Day of Pentecost, and moves us to the threshold of Advent, the season of hope for Christ's coming again at the end of time.

The day centers on the crucified and risen Christ, whom God exalted to rule over the whole universe.

The celebration of the lordship of Christ thus looks back to Ascension, Easter, and Transfiguration, and points ahead to the appearing in glory of the King of kings and Lord of lords. Christ reigns supreme. Christ's truth judges falsehood. As the Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the end, Christ is the center of the universe, the ruler of all history, the judge of all people. In Christ all things began, and in Christ all things will be fulfilled. In the end, Christ will triumph over the forces of evil.

Such concepts as these cluster around the affirmation that Christ is King or Christ reigns! As sovereign ruler, Christ calls us to a loyalty that transcends every earthly claim on the human heart. To Christ alone belongs the supreme allegiance in our lives. Christ calls us to stand with those who in every age confessed, "Jesus Christ is Lord!" In every generation, demagogues emerge to claim an allegiance that belongs only to God. But Christ alone has the right to claim our highest loyalty. The blood of martyrs, past and present, witnesses to this truth.

Behold the glory of the eternal Christ! From the beginning of time to its ending, Christ rules above all earthly powers!
