



The mission of the First United Presbyterian Church is to make disciples of all people for the glory of God through teaching, caring and worshiping.




Do you remember the children's game *Chutes and Ladders*? By taking turns, players work their way from the bottom square all the way to the top. Sometimes you get to climb a ladder which speeds you on your way. At other times you hit the top of a shoot and slide down. Just when you think you are about to win and you are ahead of everyone else, you can quickly discover a setback.

There are times when our spiritual lives can seem like a game of *Chutes and Ladders*. Most of us would be content just to be consistently moving forwad. The climbs up the ladders are indeed exciting, bu the shoots are often not anticipated and never desired.

Where the game is different from the Christian life is that our steps are not the result of an arbitrary spin of the wheel or a throw of the dice. We believe that our steps are guided by God. But, we too have a responsibility in discrning where God is leading us. Sometimes that is simply to the next square. Sometimes, if we listen closely, God will guide us to new heights. Sadly,

there are times when we don't listen and we slip and fall. But God remains forgiving and gracious and we start once again.

In recent years, the church is re-learning the spiritual act of discernment. It is less about seeking guidance over a single decision like, "should I go to college", "should I start a new job" or "should I retire?" Rather, it is more about developing a lifestyle that is constantly in tune with God.



Do you enjoy listening to music? Who doesn't, right? I particularly love the old hymns, the classical "classics," and listening to my son as he subs for the organist at First Presbyterian Church in Cedar Rapids. He is actually a master's degree-d percussion performance major with a teaching certification and is in his 23rd year of teaching/band directing/performing in Cedar Rapids. Now his 10 yr. old son is taking piano lessons and I love going over there and hearing what takes me back many-a-year to when Michael was beginning lessons on piano and drums. There's something about making music and listening to music – whether it's being played on a percussion instrument or any other instrument, piano, organ, or being sung – that brings happiness and joy to the human heart.

I love it when Connie comes to practice when I'm at church. It doesn't happen often, but occasionally I am able to listen as she practices the tunes she's preparing for the following Sunday. Some melodies I recognize, others I don't, but just listening to the organ as she plays relaxes me and brings me closer to God. Author Jennifer Camp writes, "I believe that music created in worship invites the listener right into that moment - a new moment - with God."

Moments with God brought on by music? Absolutely! God shows up in the holy spaces music allows us to inhabit. In this space we can hear His voice, feel His presence, and experience the joy of being open to His love. God's very existence makes us feel truly alive and through music we are gifted the grace and glory that only our Father can give. How fortunate we have a God that loves us so!

First United Presbyterian Church is blessed with music and worship leaders - Connie, Pastor Dave, Kevin, and pulpit supply guests - and on any given Sunday we may be singing "How Great Thou Art", "The Old Rugged Cross," or "Amazing Grace." Another Sunday we may be watching videos with lyrics from present day Christian artists. Music is a vital part of worship at First!

So, the next time you don't know a song or don't feel like singing, let the Spirit in! Listen - not just hear - listen to how God is speaking to you through music. Worship the God who loves you through the words and melodies of those familiar and sometimes unfamiliar songs. Let the words flow through you and really listen. What music brings God closer to you? How does a song make you feel alive and in God's great company?

Some Lenten hymn suggestions as we journey together: Be Still My Soul; The Old Rugged Cross; Jesus Calls us, O'er the Tumult; Lord, who Throughout These 40 Days; Take My Life and Let It Be; My Faith Looks Up to Thee; Were You There?; Blessed Assurance; Be Thou My Vision; Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing; When I Survey the Wondrous Cross; Just As I Am; O Sacred Head, Now Wounded, just to name a few. Look through a hymnal; use YouTube to listen to a song; and be a part of the season through Prayer, Word and Song. Include music in your daily spiritual life, listen for God and feel His ever-present Spirit within you.



Why is it called Fat Tuesday?


- The French phrase "Mardi Gras" translates to "Fat Tuesday".
- It's a reference to the custom of eating rich foods before the fasting season of Lent.

How is Fat Tuesday celebrated?

- People traditionally celebrate by eating rich foods and using up all the fats in their homes.
- In Michigan, people celebrate with paczki, a specialty pastry.
- In New Orleans, Fat Tuesday is a raucous day of celebration.

When is Fat Tuesday?

 Fat Tuesday falls on the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday, which marks the beginning of Lent, the 40-day period of fasting and abstinence leading up to Easter.



The 2025 World Day of Prayer program invites us into the knowledge that each one of us was made with care and love by God. When we can receive this profound truth, everything in our life changes and we begin to radiate and shine from within. We also learn how to treat every other person as made wonderful by God. Too often, women and girls have been silenced and oppressed, making this upcoming theme from WDP Cook Islands particularly relevant. The message that we, as women and girls, are "fearfully and wonderfully" made in the image of God reinforces our movement's support of women in expressing their faith and speaking about their lives in prayer and worship before God and in community.

World Day of Prayer is a worldwide, ecumenical movement of Christian women of many traditions who come together to observe a common day of prayer each year, and who, in many countries, have a continuing relationship in prayer and service.

- It is initiated and carried out by women in more than 170 countries and regions.
- It is symbolized by an annual day of celebration observed on the first Friday in March to which all people are welcome.
- It brings women of different races, cultures and traditions together in fellowship, understanding and action throughout the year.
- Through World Day of Prayer, women affirm that prayer and action are inseparable and have immeasurable influence in the world.
- The motto of World Day of Prayer is "I Made You Wonderful."
- The 2025 prayer focus is for The Cook Islands.

Fred Rogers was an ordained minister of word and sacrament for the PC(USA) and is a notable public figure whose work around peace and reconciliation are worth remembering. Rogers was also a pioneer in the world of Christian education and formation of young children. March 20th was his birthday and the day that the PC(USA) has chosen to highlight all we can learn from his work.
